- Back pain when sitting or laying
- Dull ache below waist
- •Buttock pain, may radiate to thigh/groin
- ·Pain worse climbing stairs or hills

Potential causes

- Post pregnancy
- Post lumbar fusion
- Sacral fractures
- Arthritis
- Infection
- Instability

Surgery Candidates

 Failed medication & therapy for 6 months

- At least 3 positive provocative tests
- X-Ray & CT/MRI imaging
- 75% improvement with image-guided injections
- · Steroid injection at least once
- Localized pain over the SI Joint

Post-Op Instructions

- Keep incision dry for 7-10 days
- Take antibiotics as prescribed
- Take pain meds as prescribed
- Walking as tolerated
- No lifting above 10 lbs •
- Light exercises for 8 weeks
- **Regular diet**
- NO smoking
